PARENTS' PARKING PROMISE

Parking too near to school entrances puts children in danger

The area outside our school is busy in the morning and at the end of the school day. Parents who park close to entrances act irresponsibly, potentially placing children in danger. the 'School Keep Clear' Zig Zags should maintain an area free from parked cars. This allows children and parents walking in and out of school to cross safely, where they can see and be seen by approaching traffic.

Using the car less would help reduce the congestion and danger

Many children are driven to school when they could easily walk part or all of the way. Walking has various benefits:

· Helps keep children fit and healthy;

Develops traffic awareness skills;

Keeps the environment cleaner;

· Reduces traffic outside school at start and finish times.

If you have to use a vehicle, use our Park and Stride areas

We have several areas around the school where you can park your car and have a 5 - 10 minute walk to school. This also helps keep congestion to a minimum around the school and helps the children to keep healthy and learn Important traffic awareness skills.








Author visit-KS1 and KS2






Phonics at Bierton



On Tuesday we held a parent workshop for year 1 parents. The children enjoyed their parents join in our phonics session.





What is the phonics screening check?

The phonics screening check is an informal test that children will need to complete at the end of year 1. During the test, which is designed to test their ability to decode words using their phonics knowledge, children will be required to read a mixture of 40 real and nonsense words. The phonics screening check is an important part of children's early phonics education.

How can you help your child with their reading progress?

- Read with your child, daily.
- Use the virtual classroom to reinforce the sounds taught at school.

Famous Mathematicians.

As our children are gaining a wider understanding of the world, we thought we would share some information about famous mathematicians.

Ada Lovelace



Key facts:

Life: 1815-1852

Nationality: British

Areas of expertise: Computing and algorithms

Achievements:

- Ada Lovelace was one of the first computer programmers.
- She is sometimes referred to as the 'Mother of Computing'.
- She wrote the first algorithm to be processed by a machine.
- Ada Lovelace's notes are important in the early history of computers.
- She realised that computers would be able to do more than just calculating or number-crunching.

Mathematical Concepts

Money

In an increasingly electronic orientated world, children are having less and less exposure to real money. Here are some ideas to help children become more familiar and confident with money:

- Handling money is an important part of gaining confidence around it. Start by letting them see and handle coins and notes.
- Talk about the values, similarities, and differences between different coins and notes.
- When out shopping, compare prices out loud or ask them to tell you the different prices of products.
- Encourage children to pay for items when you are out and about.
- Introduce the idea of saving for something they really want.
- Together, regularly count the money they've saved.
