Finally we have been blessed with dryer weather and some much awaited sunshine. This has provided us with the opportunity to maximise the spaces we have around our wonderful school providing our children with a wider range of resources and activities to choose to engage with during lunchtime play.

Our brand new timber trail was officially opened after the Easter holidays. Every year group is allocated 20 minutes during lunchtime play to explore and develop both physical skills and self confidence. It is great to see many of our children who were originally a bit wary of the large feature nimbly climbing around with their friends now.

The stage area is popular for a variety of antics, including showing off dance moves, karate skills, imitation, and hopefully some singing soon.

Our very own beach was finally opened up for the 1st time this year during the last 2 weeks before half term. Children from every year group are having great fun digging for treasure, building sand castles and volcanoes. For many this is the first time they have been able to play in the sand and to hear comments like 'this is the best day ever' really makes us realise how lucky we are.

The crash mats are very popular particularly with our KS2 cohorts, these are mainly used for taking turns practising gymnastic type skills. It's nice to see children that participate in gymnastics clubs outside of school helping and showing others how to do handstands, flips etc.

The front playground is dedicated to a variety of small world activities, which are rotated during the week and dependant on weather. For example lego, duplo, cars, trucks, dolls house, train track, wooden toys, dressing up, dolls, puzzles, dinosaurs, farm and zoo animals. This area is very popular with KS1 providing learning and stimulation in a quieter area.

Within the shelter playground we have our reading areas, table football, drawing and colouring. If we get that long awaited hot summer this area provides respite from the sun. This area contains our outside water feature and is also used for skipping and hula hoops.

Scooters and skateboards a favourite right from the start or our OPAL project in February last year continue to provide lots of opportunity to improve balancing skills whilst travelling with a bit of speed down the side of the Y4 classroom.

The mud kitchen and digging area which was not in use too much during the winter months is easily accessible now. The tyres are now mainly located in that area, our children enjoy rolling these about, stacking them up and climbing on and over them which helps to increase core body strength at the same time.

The MUGA continues to be sectioned off into year groups with a goal for each to play football, an area for basketball and space to practice tennis racket skills.

We are also making use of the lovely green field space beyond forest school during dry weather times. Years 5 and 6 have played football and are looking forward to playing rugby this half term too, Years 3 and 4 have played cricket and rounders, whilst those who want to just run around or sit chatting in the sun with their friends have been able to do so as well.

We are very grateful for all the donations we receive from our Bierton school community, thank you. Naturally toys and equipment wear out or break, so if you have anything which is in good condition that you would be able to pass on to the school please check with the school office. We are currently in need of footballs, buckets and spades, cars, other small toys and dolls, so if you have any of these lying around please bring them to reception.

This was just one of the many questions tackled in one hour by ten of our Year 6 children who took part in the Junior Maths Challenge earlier this month. This national competition is open to students up to Year 8, so the level of challenge was high. Amazingly, all ten children scored over 46 points (the national average) with some even gaining bronze and silver certificates!

A special mention goes to Lucinda, who was awarded the 'Best In School' accolade with an awesome score of 68. A huge well done to all of the children who participated: Charlie, Dylan, Emily, Isabella, Karenza, Lucinda, Micah, Prisha, Stanley and Tommy.

streams or the Atlantic! After a steep climb back up to the




Day 4

Y5 Science workshops at Aylesbury Grammar School



On Tuesday 9th June, Year 5 went to Aylesbury Grammar School. The children carried out lots of experiments including extracting DNA from strawberries and looking at what happens when acid and alkali are mixed together to make colours. They all had a fantastic time experiencing lessons in a secondary school laboratory!



"We did two lessons: Biology and Chemistry. In Chemistry, we did experiments using acids and alkalis. First, we had to put the acid into a boiling tube; then we put a piece of magnesium in the boiling tube, the acid started to fizz! Next, we did Biology. We were finding and extracting the DNA of a strawberry. It was a very fun day!"
