<u>ParentMail</u>

ParentMail is now up and running and we will be slowly introducing you to new features using this electronic system which will hopefully make things easier for you in the long run. It is lovely to see that 98% of our families have signed up to the email and text messaging service and that 67% of parents have already downloaded the APP.

The first new features is <u>Parents Evening Bookings</u>. To allow you to select convenient times for yourself and to also ease staff workloads, you will now book your own appointments using this system. On Thursday 13th December at 7pm the system will go live and you will receive an automatic notification to alert you to the fact that you are able to book your appointments.

- In EYFS+KS1 you will make one ten minute appointment with the class teacher.
- In Years 3+4 you will book one 5 minute appointment with the class teacher and one five minute appointment with the Maths teacher,
- In Years 5+6 you will have a ten minute appointment with the Year 5+6 Team as a
 whole so that they can discuss how your child is getting on in all aspect altogether.

There is only one appointment booking slot per child, so we do ask that wherever possible, that separated parents put their differences aside to meet to discuss their child together. We recognise that there are some exceptions to this but where possible we would ask for you to attend the same parent meeting. If this is not possible, please contact the school office to make the second appointment—please bare in mind that additional slots are limited.







UK Parliament Week/ Anti Bullying Week/ Speaking and Listening Week

The week beginning 12th November brought a lot of excitement to Bierton School. During this week, we celebrated UK Parliament by learning lots of things about law and democracy. In Year 5/6, they celebrated the one-hundred-year anniversary of women being allowed to vote; in Year 3/4, they carried out debates where the children were encouraged to challenge their own views and opinions, and in K51, they looked at democracy and the process of voting. All classes were given the opportunity to conduct a ballot box vote for the children to vote for their favourite speech. In literacy lessons, the children looked at what makes an effective speech and created their own 'steps to success'. Following on from this, the children in EYFS/KS1 discussed and wrote about what makes them special and unique. In K52, the children wrote their own manifesto about how to make Bierton a more respectful place to be. It was a fantastic week with the theme for anti-bullying week - respect - being a central part of the children's learning.



Online Safety - Monthly Top Tip!



Do you how much time your child spends playing game?

Are you aware of ways to keep your child safe when they are playing games online?



The Association for UK Interactive Entertainment has completed research into online gaming and have found:

There are 23.1 million people aged 6 and 64 playing games in the UK, which is 49% of the population in that age group.

On average, 11 to 64 year-olds in the UK spend 10.3 hours per week playing games.

Gaming can be a great way for young people to relax, socialise with their friends and have fun. Children can play on games consoles, apps or websites, and chat to other players or watch them play through live-streaming. But there are some dangers. And, with so many games available online, it can be hard for parents to know how to keep their child safe.

What are the risks of online games?

Children may view inappropriate or upsetting content if they play games that aren't suitable for their age. This could include sexual or violent material. It might be in-game content or produced by other players.

Some players can be abusive towards others or try to exclude them from the game. Some players may also hack another user's account or try to steal and destroy their virtual possessions. This can be as upsetting for a young person as if it happened in real life.

Children may play with adults they don't know. People of all ages play games. Some adults may exploit this and try to build an emotional connection with a child for the purpose of grooming.

Some children may find it hard to stop playing games or find that gaming is getting the way of them doing other activities.



5 ways to help children play safe

- 1. Check the game's content.
- 2. Know how to mute, block and report.
- 3. Be Share Aware.
- 4. Activate safety settings.
- 5. Keep the conversation going.

Online Safety Update - Grooming and Live Steaming

Earlier this year, Home Secretary - Sajid Javid, visited The Centre of Expertise on Child Sexual Abuse (CEOP) and was astounded by some of the statistics linked to online grooming. Below are some of the statistics he shared in his speech and other information provided about grooming and live streaming:



Grooming

In the past 5 years, there has been a 700% increase in the number of grooming incidents.

The victims of the cases prosecuted last year:

25% were under 11 years old.

62% were between 12 and 15 years old.

In the UK, it has been estimated that around 80,000 people pose some form of sexual threat to children.

Research from the NSPCC suggests that some children are being groomed online in less than 45 minutes.

CEOP estimates that 15% of girls and 5% of boys experience some form of sexual abuse before the age of 16.

Live Streaming

Live Steaming figures from videos found: incidents:



98% of the images were of children below 13 years old.

28% of the images were of children below 10 years old.

96% were girls.

96% were children on their own.

During his speech, Sajid Javid also shared this information,

"The growth of the internet has given potential offenders who previously may have had no access to children the opportunity to meet and groom and abuse victims online on gaming sites and on social media and to get access to more abuse material than ever before. And as parents and guardians, we can all play an important role in tackling online child sexual exploitation and abuse.

We don't send our kids out to play in the park or teach them to cross the road alone without giving them advice. But when it comes to their time spent on the internet or glued to their smartphones, it's often a different story.

Too often we're afraid to ask our kids the questions that really matter for their safety.

Who are they speaking to online?

What forums are they using?

What are they sharing online?

It is clear that we cannot afford to shy away from having these frank and open conversations with the children in our lives.

In future newsletters, we will be sending out further advice and top tips on how to promote a safe and healthy online attitude. However, if you require any information or advice, please feel free to contact us at any time.

During the activity, we were analysing different artefacts which were used by the Vikings during their daily deeds. We saw an elaborate goblet which had a charming snake pattern which went with it. Adding to this, there was a fine leather water bottle that could be carried around. We saw many others, including: a jewellery box with elegant rubies and jewels on it; a timber candle holder; a Viking toy and last but not least a steal Viking fork.

We had our lunch in great haste as we were ravenous and then proceeded onto our next activity. We ambled back into the forest where we found a variety of activities. First, we learned how to make wool which was used to make clothing that the Vikings wore. We smoothed out the thick and wiry cotton into a fine, smooth strand by using two sharp combs. Next, we used a spinner to



make it into a long thread. We journeyed onto our next task which was making a wall (not a real wall, of course!) out of bamboo sticks. After five minutes, we made a wall and next we attempted to make sparks using flint and steel. This task was extremely difficult so we had another go using different equipment.



Finally, our tiresome day came to an end. We got on the coach and travelled home. We were very tired (some of us even slept...). When we got to school, we were very late. We all enjoyed our excitable day at Ufton Court.

Year 5/6 Viking Celebration Day!

On Thursday 29th of November, we rounded off our Viking unit with a day of Viking- related activities! During the day, we completed a rotation of activities that tested our writing, maths, geography, art and design skills.

To begin the day, we continued creating our two-page spreads, all about a chosen topic. Within all classes, there were a variety of topics: Viking weapons and warriors, long-boats, entertainment, lifestyles, clothing, runes and the Gods. Firstly, we had to plan and research an area, then, we had to consider our audience and purpose when presenting our information on the page.



Next, we examined longboats and looked at artwork that contained them. We were able to choose different art mediums to create a sunset background and contrasted it with a silhouette longboat in either black sugar paper or paint.

Lastly, in Hawthorn class, we examined where the Vikings had a settled and how we can trace back their existence due to the names of counties and places today. For example, if a place ends it 'by', such as Whitby, it means that the Vikings settled there as the word originated from the Viking lan-

guage! To complete the activity, we had to use our map skills to locate all the different

Viking places.

After lunch, we examined artefacts and discussed what we could discover about the Vikings from examining them. We looked at the materials they would have had and the skills needed to create the objects. Afterwards, we had the opportunity to draw and use clay to create representations of the artefacts. During the afternoon, our parents and grandparents were also able to join us to celebrate all our hard work over the term. We showed them our books, artwork and DT projects and were able to tell them all the information and fun facts that we had learnt about the Vikings since September. It was fantastic to have the

opportunity to create clay artefacts with our parents and grandparents too.
